

It is an honor and privilege to welcome you aboard the USS Hornet in celebration of UA Local 342's centennial jubilee. We are proud to share this milestone with our members, contractors, vendors, industry professionals, and end-users.

The USS Hornet's creed is "A Heritage of Excellence." While the ship boasts a two hundred year legacy, we like to think Steamfitters Local 342 can boast its own set of accomplishments for workers from yester-years through today. One hundred years ago Steamfitters Local 342 was organized into the United Association of Journeyman and Apprentices in the Plumbing and Pipefitting Industry of the United States and Canada. It began with twenty-one charter members who sought a shorter work-day, wage increases, and better working conditions. Those original members endured adverse conditions that are well documented in the history of the America Labor Movement.

What started as a small band of steamfitters grew to encompass workers in the welding, pipeline, refrigeration, and plumbing trades. The acquisition of these skilled trades came by way of mergers with other UA locals, and helped to establish one of the strongest examples of a combination local.

The USS Hornet has become one of the most distinguished names in American naval history with its Heritage of Excellence. Like the USS Hornet, UA Local 342 has persevered through many hard-fought battles and has come out with its core values intact, "Fidelity, Protection, Education, and Benevolence." It is with these values in mind that we have arrived in the twenty-first century ready to face the challenges of the next 100 years.



The United Association

The United Association began in 1889, and served as an umbrella organization for the many unaffiliated or strictly local plumbers' unions. The roots of the UA can be traced back to P.J. Quinlan, a plumber from Massachusetts. He wrote a letter to Richard O'Brien, a plumber in Washington, D.C., with the hope of getting the scattered unions to consolidate and form a stronger, wider-reaching, and more influential organization. Quinlan was to become the union's first president, and O'Brien its first secretary-treasurer.

Since then the UA has earned a special place in the history of unionized labor in North America. Its members contributed greatly to the building boom of the Industrial Revolution, suffered through the Great Depression, aided in the rebuilding of the nation and played key roles in the World War II effort. From its humble origins on the East Coast to its current position as a collective voice for hundreds and thousands of members across North America, the union has a history that is lengthy and rich.

United Association Local 342 Our History

In 1903:

During August 1903, Plumbers, Gas Fitters, and Steamfitters UA Local 444, Oakland, CA was chartered with only thirty-nine members. On June 1, of the same year the American Federation of Labor (A.F of L.) revoked the charter of the National Association of Steam and Hot Water Fitters and Helpers of America, leaving the United Association as the only recognized international union with the right of control and jurisdiction over the entire pipe trades industry.

May 1, 1914:

Steamfitters UA Local 342, Oakland, CA was chartered. Twenty-one members who disbanded from Locals 590, 441, 442, 444, 343, 387, 217, 230, 166, and 19 came together to form a new charter. Local 342 belonged to what was known in the Bay Area and to our international body as the Bay District American Federation of Labor (A.F. of L.). The Bay District A.F. of L. was made up of seven local unions consisting of straight-line and combination pipe trade local unions.

January 24, 1939:

Two hundred fifty steamfitters were acquired by UA Local 342 from one of the oldest Bay District A. F. of L. unions, UA Local 436 - Point Richmond. Local 436 was a straight-line steamfitters union that received its charter in December 1903.

January 31, 1949:

Plumbers, Gas Fitters, and Steamfitters UA Local 444 absorbed Gas Appliance and Stove Fitters UA Local 340. Local 340 had begun its charter with twenty-one members who separated from Gas Appliance and Stove Fitters UA Local 706, San Francisco. They remained in existence for only ten short years before merging into Local 444. The remaining Bay District A.F. of L. UA locals were UA Local 441 Steamfitters, San Francisco and UA Local 442, Plumbers and Steamfitters, San Francisco.

In 1952:

Plumbers, Gas Fitters, and Steamfitters UA Local 444 revised its standing and were reissued a new charter name known as UA Local 444 Building & Construction and Metal Trades Divisions. From 1903 to 1993 they grew from thirty-nine members to 1,146 members.

January 1, 1994:

Plumbers UA Local 444 merged with Steamfitters UA Local 342, Oakland, CA to form the eleventh largest local in the United Association, Building and Construction and Metal Trades Divisions - Plumbers and Steamfitters, UA Local 342 Oakland, CA.

Dear Sir and Brother:

This will acknowledge receipt of your report in which you recommend that Local Union 444 be merged into Local Union 342. I concur with your recommendation and you are authorized to proceed with this merger, to become effective January 1, 1994.

Effective January 1, 1994, the members of Local Union 444 will be transferred to the cash sheets of Local Union 342. Local Union 342 will assume all assets and liabilities of Local Union 444. Also, trade and territorial jurisdiction of Local 444 will be transferred to Local 342.

The merger will be governed by the terms of the Memorandum of Understanding Regarding Merger of U.A. 444 into U.A. 342 dated October 18, 1993 and adopted by vote of the memberships of Locals 342 and 444 on October 26, 1993. Steps shall be taken to ensure that all actions pertaining to fringe benefit funds are fair and equitable and comply with applicable laws.

Upon completion of all arrangements, the seal and charter of Local 444 is to be returned to the office of the General Secretary-Treasurer.

I have been instructed by Local Union No. 444 to request that you give space in our Journal for the accompanying article on the Alameda Naval Base at Alameda, California. Trusting you may give this important matter your early attention, I am,

The recently awarded Naval Base at Alameda, California, and the possibilities of immediate employment by the various crafts thereon. In view of the fact the Congressional Committee has recommended to Congress the establishment of a Naval Base on what is known as the Alameda site, the question will undoubtedly be advertised with the purpose of bringing a large number of men here in the hope of obtaining employment in the building of, and operating the base. To us who are on the ground the fact is very apparent that no matter how soon work will be started, nor how great may be the appropriations therefor, it is going to be years before any considerable number of men can be employed thereon.

In the first place, the site is under water ranging in depth from six to fifteen feet. In

the second place, the site must be surveyed and full data obtained before any constructive work is begun, and this alone will take months, if not years.

After the necessary surveys are completed, thousands upon thousands of piles must be driven and dredgers must be put to work in order to bring the location above tide water, making a substantial base to work upon. This filling in and drying of the same will in all probability take years.

The Congressional Committee, in making the recommendation for the site, noted the fact that large appropriations at this time would be unnecessary, as the land to be occupied must first of all be filled in, the accomplishment of which will only afford employment for such as surveyors, pile drivers and dredgermen.

We understand the Naval Base is not to be a building shipyard, but rather a base for ships in service, such as a supply station, etc. Building of and repairing ships will continue for many years at the present Mare Island Navy Yard, where there are at present more than enough mechanics to supply the demand.

Not until the base itself is finally completed, or until Congress decides to build ships there, will there be work for any considerable number of men.

Let us not overlook this important fact—when the work is started it will not be conducted under the stress of emergency such as characterized operations of this kind during the period of actual war time, but on the contrary will proceed in the usual Governmental manner, which, in the opinion of the writer, is generally one of conservative delay and red tape, no such thing as double shifts and overtime being known.

Now, in view of these facts, Local Union No. 444 has determined that every effort should be made to stop the common practice of flooding the local labor market with men who cannot be employed, but as unemployed men will be compelled to compete with the workers of this district for employment, thereby adding to the general stagnation of the labor market.

We feel that no effort should be spared in giving the utmost publicity to the true state of affairs here, thereby impressing upon the minds of our general membership and, I might say, building tradesmen in general, the folly of arriving here, in all probability at the instigation of alluring advertisements, only to find no employment, and possibly themselves in destitute circumstances.

Everyone is aware of the general state of unemployment throughout the nation at the present time, and while our members may be unable to secure work in their own sections, we feel that it is far better to be idle at home than it is to be abroad and among strangers.

In conclusion, brothers, we hope and trust that this article may not be confounded with a selfish desire on the part of the East Bay locals, but is merely actuated by a humanitarian spirit.

Tusting that all who may consider coming this way in view of the possibilities of immediate work at the Alameda Naval Base will give the matter due consideration, I am

On one particular mission, the patrol boat on which Brother Briggs was serving joined with another patrol vessel to attack a barge within 300 yards of enemy installations. The other vessel was hit. The cool and accurate fire from the turret in which Briggs was firing provided the major part of the cover needed for a successful withdrawal after the Japanese barge had been sunk..

The Officers and members of the United Association unite to congratulate Brother Briggs for his gallantry under fire. We know that Local Union No. 342 must feel proud that one of its men has so distinguished himself and brought honor to the entire local union.





Local 444 Members at Work on Kaiser Industries Building



MORE than two dozen members of Local 444, Oakland, California, are among the hundreds of building trades members who are erecting a new and handsome addition to the city's skyline.

The 28-story world headquarters of the Kaiser industrial organization—key structure in the \$45,000,000 "city-within-a-city" Kaiser Center—will dominate a seven-acre site overlooking Lake Merritt in downtown Oakland.

Scheduled for completion in late 1959, the Center will consist of a complete downtown shopping area, a five-level parking structure, and a four-acre roof garden with reflecting pool—in addition to the huge gold and gray office building. It will occupy a seven-acre site along the western shore of Lake Merritt, between 20th and 21st streets and Harrison and Webster streets.

The Center's 1,650,000 square feet of space will include a gross area of

976,000 square feet in the office building—making it the largest west of the Rocky Mountains—and 674,000 square feet in the shop and parking structure. The office structure will contain 802,000 net square feet of usable space.

Rising 390 feet above street level, the office building will be "floated" on a five-foot thick concrete slab foundation, 62 feet wide by 420 feet long.

The 28-story glass and aluminum structure will form a curved arc following the Harrison Street shore line of Lake Merritt.

Contemporary in design, the building will be sheathed front and back in anodized gold and gray aluminum and glass. End panels of the office structure will consist of massive 5 feet by 13 feet sections of precast white dolomite aggregate stone. Special window glass will be used, eliminating heat and glare. Approximately 150,000 square feet, or three and one-half

acres, of glass will be employed throughout the building.

The interior of the office structure will include 20,000 square feet of space for shops and stores on the first floor, an auditorium, cafeteria, electronic computer section, and a medical clinic for employees.

Seventeen high-speed automatic elevators will carry traffic from the lobby to three zones in the office building. Six elevators will service the 1st to 11th floors; five will provide express service to the 11th and local service from the 11th to 19th floors; and six will be express to the 19th and local from the 19th to the 28th floors. Two freight elevators will serve the main building and additional elevators will be located in the five level garage and shop structure.

The main auditorium on the second floor will seat 400 persons. The auditorium will contain specially designed

king-size seats, a movie projection booth, light coves in a recessing pattern of vertical troughs along the sides, and a large glass-enclosed foyer fronting on Lake Merritt.

A spacious cafeteria-dining room, overlooking the Lake on the second floor, will accommodate 800 persons, and may be converted into a 1,200-seat banquet room by closing off the serving area.

A gentle, single-season climate will be maintained throughout the building by means of radiant ceiling air-conditioning. Consisting of perforated squares of aluminum, behind which is assembled a system of pipes carrying hot or cold water, the ceiling in each office of the building will radiate an evenly-controlled temperature throughout the day to all points of the room. Interior air will be circulated through special ducts, also located in the ceiling.

Another unique feature of the Kaiser Center office building will be a push-button control mailing system that will deliver mail to any floor of the building by the simple pressure of a finger. A pneumatic tube system will be used for the transmittal of wire messages.

The Scott Company is the Mechanical contractor on the Kaiser Building.

1960 California









The Training Center cost approximately \$475,000. The structure was made possible through a building fund which was inaugurated in 1966. Later a dues check-off

system was adopted to supplement the building fund.

The Training Center Building has 27,000 square feet of space with five (5) classrooms; a welding bay, which consists of thirty-eight (38) welding booths, and electric, acetylene and fine wire equipment which was made possible through grants from the International Training Fund. The Mechanical Room, providing for the heat and air conditioning, was installed by members of the union. The Training Center also has facilities for the union's business offices.

One of the most modern in the West Coast Area, the Center will service the union's apprentices and also serve as the supplemental training center for the jour-

neymen with large enough facilities to accommodate UA sister Local Union's needs.





Now Seeks To Safety-Proof Individual Worker

The Occupational Safety and Health Act passed in 1971 provided for the establishment of safety and health standards in industry and for the enforcement of those long overdue guidelines. In the vanguard of forces urging such legislation was the United Association. Little wonder, since the on-the-job injury and death rate has always been high among construction workers.

At present the UA, its locals and its members are joining together in a further attempt to prevent job injuries and deaths. Safety awareness is spreading. One means of broadcasting the message is through instructor training safety courses. These study groups are forming with increasing frequency as local leaders realize more fully the need for such a program.

The most recent instructor training safety courses reported to the *UA Journal* were held in California and in Min-

nesota. In each of these two cases, several locals participated in the special study program.


And what better way to swiftly spread the message than to prepare local instructors to teach the subject? One experienced teacher, having completed the Instructors Training Safety Course, can effectively teach safety awareness and techniques to his fellow union members.

The safety and health law has been passed. But legislation alone cannot safety-proof a worker. Total job-safety involves many factors. The law can see to it that a man's working environment is maintained in safe condition. But a large part of the battle for safety at work must be fought, and won, in the awareness and attitude of each individual worker toward safety.


Local 342 Members Complete Prudhoe Bay Module Project



Editor's Note: The following is a first-person account by Frank Manibusan, an apprentice with Local 342 in Concord, California, about his efforts to rescue people trapped in the debris of the Nimitz Freeway after the October 17 Bay Area earthquake.

I was at my mom's house, where she also has a dance studio. I was outside holding my 19-month-old daughter. The awning started shaking and I ran inside and found 25 three- to 10-year-old children crying and upset. We got them outside and calmed down.

I checked on my grandfather, then Al Taitague and I checked my house. I heard on TV that the Cypress section of the freeway had collapsed. We were 5 miles away. Al and I took off to help.

I knew that my brother and three sisters-in-law travel that section of the freeway every day about 5 p.m., and I was afraid they could be trapped.

I told a firefighter that we worked for Scott Company and we had the kind of tools they needed and knew how to use them. At first, he said he couldn't allow us to help, then he introduced us to his chief. We told him we had a cutting torch, band saw, chain falls, "come-a-longs," a "Sawzall," and pry bars. The chief told Al and I to go with the fireman.

A MAN ALIVE

What we saw was terrible. A 3-ft.-thick concrete support from the upper deck had fallen to the lower deck. Two cars had hit it head-on. The far car was on fire. We couldn't make up our minds if it would blow up or already had. We gambled and approached the cars on our hands and knees. All we saw was part of a burned body.

We passed by two empty cars and then we saw a man who was alive.

He was in a full-sized pickup truck that had been crushed down to three feet. The door was partially pried open, so Al went to get a chain fall, sling, pry bars, and a flashlight.

I worked with two firemen, Andy and Victor. We hooked the three-quarter-ton chain fall to the freeway railing and the sling to the door. You can't believe the amount of stress we put on the door before it moved enough for us to get to the man.

I learned the victim's name was Tim. He had a crushed sternum and he was vomiting blood. His left ankle, badly broken, bent up toward his knee. The steering wheel had collapsed, crushing both legs. He was screaming from the pain.

We tried cutting the bottom and back off the seat. It didn't work. We slashed and removed the padding from the seat, which lowered him about one inch so he got some relief from the pain.

Even though gasoline had leaked from some of the cars, it was far enough away that I took a chance and got

the Sawzall to cut the springs out of the seat. Working with gloves on was impossible but every time I cut a spring, another one would cut my hand.

There was another tremor. We were afraid the top deck would collapse on us.

STILL PINNED

We got the brake and gas pedals out of the way and cut the interior out of the fender, but the steering wheel was the main thing holding us up. His limbs were still jammed. I was finally able to get the Sawzall on the steering wheel column, but could only hold it with one hand. I cut on it for about 30 minutes. We put the chain fall on the wheel and rigged the other end to the rail. We finally snapped the wheel off, but Tim was still pinned.

Andy suggested we jack up the dash, and that one of us climb under it and pull Tim's legs up. As the smallest, I was the only one who would fit. I insisted on setting the jack myself, shored it up with two-by-fours, then climbed in. When Andy said, "go," I grabbed Tim's legs and pulled them up.

We still couldn't get him out because the jacks were in the way. Once we got the tools and jacks out of the way, Andy pulled him out. Tim was vomiting blood again. We only had 2.5- to 3-ft. to work, and we had to pull him through broken glass and rubble. We finally got him to the side and loaded on a fork lift. I was so happy. The crowd cheered as the firefighters lowered Tim.

Tim's Dad called me after the rescue. Tim will be okay.

After the rescue, Al was missing. It was late, the crowd had gone, and I was afraid he was hurt. He has a wife and three kids. I kept thinking, "I brought him here to get killed."

I walked from one end of the Cypress to the other. When I hit a dead-end on the top deck, I climbed to the bottom deck and kept yelling for Al. An hour and a half later, I saw Al in firefighter's clothes, waving from the ground.

He had found a six-year-old boy still alive. The boy's legs were trapped under the body of his dead mother. Al watched as rescue workers cut through the body of the dead woman to reach the trapped boy. They also had to amputate one of the boy's legs to get him free.

I couldn't have done what I did if I hadn't been in this trade. I owe it all to the guys I work with and to my training. While I was up there, I kept wishing that a Scott Company journeyman mechanic was with me. I learned a lot from the guys who taught me how to rig, and how to deal with the logistical problems of moving heavy equipment. Guys like Stan, Mitch, Greg, John, Dan, Fergi, J.C., Bob, Pete, and Jay. My apprenticeship training from Local 342 also came in handy.





Brother Long was elected to his local's Executive Board in 1974 and served in that capacity until elected Local 286 Business Manager in 1977.



Perhaps no other state has as stringent environmental regulations as does California. For this reason, UA pipeliners and others working on the project were required to perform their work under extremely tight restrictions, in confined areas and under the constant threat of being closed down for even the slightest, inadvertent violation of the many rules imposed on the project.

These environmental restrictions also created some engineering challenges, which the pipeliners met with great enthusiasm.

For example, UA members constructed a 3,986-foot crossing of the Sacramento River, the longest

42-inch crossing in the world accomplished by horizontal drilling.

In addition, a 2,840-foot crossing of Dutch Slough and a 3,536-foot crossing of the San Joaquin River were also accomplished successfully.

All of these channels are navigable waterways that are up to 15 feet higher than the bordering land. The elevated waterway required the construction of sheet-pile containment structures the size of two football fields in order to protect the surrounding area from flooding.

The underground bores were put in place 100 feet below the river bottom.

Pipeline construction is complex work that relies on detailed schedules, beginning with engineering designs all the way through the burying of the pipe.

Preliminary work is com-


pleted prior to arrival of the pipe sections and the welding gangs. This includes securing rights-of-way, surveying and grading of the proposed route, as well as ditching operations.

The proper pipe is placed adjacent to the ditch. Depending on the requirements of the project, some pipe is subjected to a coating operation. The coating may be applied prior to the stringing of the pipe along the pipeline route, or after the pipe has been strung.

In the case of the PGT/PG&E pipeline project, coating was done prior to shipping it to the jobsite. All of the welds are coated, and any damage done to the pipe during stringing or welding is subjected to additional coating before the completed line is lowered into the ditch.

On the PGT/PG&E pipeline, the second process—line travel coating—was used.

Once actual construction





of the pipeline is underway, the project moves quickly and with remarkable efficiency. On this project, the pipeliners were faced with an added challenge: the pipe was strung across farm fields, over massive hills and through the mountains. It was a challenge they met with great skill and perseverance.

The bending process requires great skill to meet the specific measurements specified for each section of pipe. Instructions written on the outside of the pipe by the bending engineer indicate the type of bend and the degree required to fit the terrain.

Following the bending, UA pipeline welders move in.

The pipe gang moves in




remarkably orchestrated fashion, with absolutely no wasted time or motion. Their efficiency is extraordinary, but the quality of their work is even more amazing.

On the PGT/PG&E expansion project, the reject rate on welds is about 3%, a truly incredible percentage given the fact that the welders perform hundreds of welds every week on the job,

completing about two miles of pipeline a day. Each weld is 100% x-rayed for defects.

The importance of their skill at welding cannot be overemphasized. How well the pipe is welded determines the quality, safety and operational life of the entire pipeline.

The attention to quality is manifested in every inch of the pipeline. Before welding



even begins, the pipe is positioned properly and the pipe ends are carefully prepared.

The pipe gang is responsible for positioning the pipe, aligning it and making the initial welds to the extremely precise tolerances required.

Pipe ends are thoroughly cleaned and properly beveled. The pipe is then aligned by having a side-boom operator raise and support the joint of pipe and then maneuver it into posi-

tion with the pipe string already in place.

An internal line-up clamp is run through the last joint to the point where the pipe ends meet. An air hose supplies pneumatic power to the clamp.

The spacing between the

beveled ends is determined by the welding process being used. This is critical to ensure adequate penetration of the weld material into the space between the bevels.

Highly skilled members of the pipe gang—the “spacers”—place a spacing tool into the interface between the pipe bevels to create a uniform distance around the entire circumference of the area to be welded.

At this point, the extraordinary skills of UA welders come into play. The initial weld is referred to as the root bead or stringer bead. It is made while the internal line-up clamp is still in place.

Two to four welders work simultaneously on opposite sides of the pipe, and when their work is done, the clamp is carefully released. A second welding crew then makes a hot-pass weld.

Following completion of the root bead and the hot-pass, the firing line crew takes over.

The firing line builds on the welding material already in place, creating filler beads. After carefully grinding and cleaning each weld surface, a final welding pass—the cap bead—completes the joint.

It is important to note that these welds take place in rapid succession, with rigs moving up and beyond each other in a smooth line, without a break in the process. It is much like an assembly line, with each step in the process occurring at precisely the correct moment.

There is a rhythm to the pipe gang, a steady movement from beginning to end of a day's work on the pipeline.

The pipe gang is well aware of this rhythm, and alert to situations that might cause a break in the continuity of welding operations. If they are confronted with such a situation, the regular crews will bypass

that point and move on to a weld that is ready for them.

The tie-in crew will go back later and complete this work after the pipe has been lowered into the ditch.

Tie-in itself involves welding at road and river crossings, on valves, portions of the pipeline left disconnected for testing and other fabrications that might be required. The tie-in crew also does other work, such as coating.

At each tie-in point, a carefully measured extra portion of pipe is left on the ends. Often, if backfilling has begun, the tie-in crew confronts the challenge of working in confined spaces, with just enough room to maneuver the ends into position.

Tie-in welds use external clamps until all of the stringer bead is in place. As with all other welds made throughout the pipeline, those completed during tie-in will be thoroughly inspected for defects.

The goal of every UA pipeliner is to see the project completed on time, with the minimum number of rejects and successful testing.

Once testing is complete and the pipeline is ready to go on-line, UA pipeliners can relax and take pride in a job well done.

Contractors on the project also appreciated the skills of UA pipeliners and craftsmen on this project. One representative of Bechtel, Inc. noted that the work was done in record time, on schedule or even ahead of schedule in some cases. And all this with an incredibly small percentage of weld rejects, a fact that was noted with great respect by the construction manager for PGT.

The families who eventually benefit from a project like the PG&E expansion will never know the skill and labor that goes into a job like

Local 342 Is All Heart For Their Community

It seems that when UA locals hear of community projects in need, without hesitation, they jump right in. Plumbers and Steamfitters Local 342, Oakland, California, is no exception. Shepherd's Gate, a transitional facility for battered women, had put in their newsletter that they were seeking donations of money, materials and labor for a new facility in Livermore, California. They were in great need of expanding because they had outgrown the existing facility, and were at the point of turning away women and children because they could not accommodate them.

Brother David Mann saw this situation as an opportunity for the members of Local 342 to give back to their community and volunteer their skills, by installing the plumbing in the new facility.

Surprisingly, Brother Mann was the first person to contact the facility regarding any type of volunteer efforts. The facility was planning to do the plumbing themselves. It seemed like a great opportunity for Local 342 to volunteer and demonstrate how to "do it right the first time."

The project consisted of a 1,200-square-foot office and a two-story, 10,000-square-foot residence building. There were to be over 40 fixtures, 14 gas-fired units and some roof drains with overflows. The new building was projected to accommodate around 35 women and children.

With the commitment of many Local 342 members and the backing of the local union, the project was undertaken. Donations commenced with the underground piping in July of 1998; the slab was poured, but then the project halted. More donations and volunteers would be needed before the framing could start. For the next year and a half, it continued this way, and despite the delays and obstructions to completion, the commitment of the brothers and sisters of Local 342 never wavered.

Brother Mann commented, "I had no idea the project would take this long. One, if not all, of the 'regulars' were always there and many times showed up with another brother or sister to help. They are the ones who should be commended. They made a commitment and never once said 'no'."

The director of Shepherd's Gate remarked to Brother Mann, "I still cannot believe what Local 342 has done for us. I tell people what your union has



LOCAL 342 SKILLFULLY UPDATES A LANDMARK REFINERY



Tesoro's Golden Eagle Refinery,

located 30 miles east of San Francisco, adjacent to the cities of Martinez and Concord, is the company's largest facility. Located on 2,300 acres in Contra Costa County and referred to as the "gentle giant" in the California refining community, the Golden Eagle Refinery is the second largest refinery in Northern California, with a rated crude oil conversion capacity of 166,000 barrels per day.

Local 342 members, working under the leadership of Business Manager Jay Williams, and with the support of International Representative James Kellogg, in Oakland, California, are

hard at work modifying Tesoro's coker unit from a fluid coker unit to a delayed coker unit. Partnering with their signatory contractor, Cherne Contracting, a unionized heavy-industrial national contractor which primarily serves the petro-chemical and power industries, Local 342 members have had a constant presence at the Golden Eagle Refinery. Journeymen and apprentices have always maintained the miles of pipe that make up this impressive facility, and now they have been assigned, working with Cherne Senior Vice President Tom Van Oss, the complex task of Tesoro's Coker Modification Project.







In addition to California crude oil, Golden Eagle also processes crudes delivered by tanker from Alaska and overseas to docks on Suisun Bay and the Carquinez Strait in Northern California. Refined products, such as clean-burning gasoline and ultra-low-sulphur diesel, are shipped to customers via truck, rail, tanker, barge and pipelines serving Northern California and the Reno/Lake Tahoe regions of Western Nevada. In addition, the plant has fluid catalytic cracking, hydrocracking, reforming, alkylation and fluid coking capabilities. Golden Eagle has been specially designed to process heavier crude oil feedstocks, which allows it to produce heavy fuel oils, liquefied petroleum gas and petroleum coke.

In 2005, the San Francisco Bay Area Air Quality Management District mandated the abatement of particulate dust and dust material that could be potentially released by coker units during malfunctions. The mandated abatement order encouraged Tesoro to upgrade the coker unit to eliminate the possibility of this pollutant. The order was to be addressed by June 2008. After careful analysis, Tesoro determined that the best response to the new mandate would be to build a new delayed coker unit which would eliminate the possibility of future incidents with sooty pollutants, and make an everlasting positive impact on the environment.

This was a huge undertaking and a very expensive decision, with Tesoro investing over \$415 million in the modification project. In the long run, the new coker facility would be more reliable, turnaround cycles would be lengthened, operating costs would be reduced, and Tesoro would be able to meet the mandate. Moreover, Tesoro would have more flexibility in the types of crude oil it could process, which would allow the company to purchase the most cost-effective crude mix available on the market. It was a win-win situation. When it was time to pick a contractor to complete the complex modification, it was no surprise that Tesoro turned to Cherne Contracting and the skilled craftsmen and women from Local 342.

The modification would allow the current units to move from being fluid units to delayed coker units, which would utilize up-to-date delayed coking technology. The Coker Modification Project would allow Golden Eagle to process heavier crude oil into consumer products, such as the cleaner burning California Air Resources Board (CARB) gas and diesel fuels to be sold to consumers. Modifying to delayed coker units would reduce greenhouse gas emissions by over 3,000 tons per year. This figure equates to 3,000 tons less sulfur dioxide; nearly 700 tons less ammonia; nearly 300 tons less nitrogen oxides; and approximately 50 tons less carbon monoxide and particulate matter

pollution emitted from the refinery. The project would also replace the current use of anhydrous ammonia with aqueous ammonia, a much safer form of the chemical. This reduction in gas emissions has major environmental benefits, satisfying the San Francisco Bay Area Air Quality Management District emissions order. The final product of the delayed coker would be a wet, dust-free product that can be loaded onto trucks and shipped to steel mills and other industrial sites for use as combustible material. The project is scheduled for completion in March 2008.

"This is an enormous project, and accordingly it has been broken down into manageable milestones," said Tesoro Managing Director of Major Projects and Construction Pablo Otero. "In July of 2006, we broke ground to begin site preparation, and we planned and orchestrated the first pour of cement in December."

The decision to move from a fluid coker to a delayed coker unit was an excellent decision. A delayed coker is very different from a fluid coker, but still runs the same feedstock and produces similar products. Delayed coking is a "semi-batch" process, rather than a continuous process like most units. Local 342 members displayed their craftsmanship and their understanding of the complex systems involved. A delayed coker is

similar to a crude unit. Tesoro's delayed coker will work like this:

- Hot resid from the feed preps and #3 crude will come up the resid line to a new coker feed surge drum. The resid feed will be pumped into the bottom of the new fractionator.
- From the fractionator, the feed is pumped very quickly through two large fired heaters, heating up the feed to about 930 degrees Fahrenheit. Steam is added to the feed to increase the velocity through the heater.
- From the heaters, the feed goes to two of the four coke drums. Inside the drum, the oil slows down, and has time to thermally crack, creating coke and vapors. Delayed cokers are called that because the coking reaction is delayed until the oil hits the drum.
- Two drums are always on line, while the other two drums are having the coke removed. Each drum is filled for 18 hours. At that point, the drum is full, and the oil from the heater is switched to its partner drum. Drums one and two are partners, as are three and four. Drum cycles are staggered so that each pair switches nine hours after the other pair. This means that every nine hours a drum will fill and need to be switched.
- Vapors from the coke drum go to the fractionator, where products are separated, just as they currently are in the fluid coker scrubber and fractionator. The delayed coker will make

heavy gas oil (HGO), medium gas oil (MGO), light gas oil (LGO), distillate and wet gas. The HGO and MGO will go to the #3 hydrogen desulphurization unit (HDS), the LGO will go to the hydrocracker, and the distillate and wet gas will go to the #5 gas plant.

- Full coke drums are "de-coked" by using high-pressure water to cut the coke from the drum. Coke will fall into the coke pit below the drums, where it will be picked up by a crane and put onto conveyors, which go into a truck-loading hopper. Delayed coke will be trucked out of the refinery.

One advantage of the delayed coker is that it does not require a CO boiler. When the delayed coker is operational, #5 boiler house will be shut down. There will be no need for stacks, or switching CO gas to the #6 boiler house.


"The project is progressing very well, and construction is approximately 80 percent complete. Field staffing is at its maximum with journeymen and apprentices working six days a week, utilizing both day and evening shifts. We plan to be mechanically complete in March of 2008, whereupon we will start our final turnaround tie-in effort," stated Tesoro's Director of Major Projects and Construction Mike Hollingshaus. He continued, "The UA and Cherne team are providing exceptional leadership, commitment and quality work, which is essential

to achieving our world-class aggressive schedule. In this business you ultimately win with people! Tesoro is pleased with the safety, quality of work, labor relations and productivity that we see from the UA Local 342 team."

A true collaborative approach is keeping this very important project on schedule and meeting performance goals. Tesoro, Cherne and the UA have come together—involving all parties—in strategic formulation and job site execution for each component in the overall project plan. Four hundred and fifty skilled journeymen are currently on board, with numbers expected to peak at 500 to complete the modification. A project this large and detailed includes the installation of 112,000 feet of large bore pipe, which includes 7,100 large bore pipe welds.

Small bore piping will top out at about 100,000 feet, incorporating 7,000 small bore pipe welds. Local 342 members installed about 56,000 feet of steam trace tubing and 18,500 feet of instrument tubing. This required the erection of 35,500 pipe supports, 55 pumps, 15 heat exchangers, 12 vessels and 2,775 instruments in all to complete the modification.

Tom Van Oss, Cherne senior vice president of operations, stated, "This job should be used as a model for tripartite cooperation. The communication, coordination and cooperation between Tesoro, Cherne, and organized labor have been the best I have ever experienced, and Local 342 has been the leader in this effort throughout the project."
